## Fair Operating Guidelines

The Fair's primary goal is to ensure the safety and equitable treatment and access to all visitors, exhibitors, volunteers, and fairgoers. To accomplish this goal, we enforce the following rules and guidelines during our events.

## Fair Rules \& Policies

All final decisions regarding all Shippensburg Community Fair exhibits, events or activities will be made by the Shippensburg Community Fair Executive Committee.

No alcohol, illegal drugs or fireworks will be allowed on the fairgrounds.
No pets, except service animals and properly identified service animals-in-training will be allowed anywhere on the fairgrounds. Arrangements for service animals must be made in advance and approved by safety personnel.

The right is reserved to inspect at any time exhibits, shows, concession booths, stalls, or animals at the fairgrounds.
Exhibitors and volunteers over 18 years of age grant permission to the Shippensburg Community Fair to use their name, likeness, voice and words in television, radio, films, newspapers, magazines, and other media and in any form, not heretofore describe for the lawful purpose and activities of the Shippensburg Community Fair. Exhibitors and volunteers understand that they will not receive any compensation for the use of their name or likeness.

## General Guidelines \& Rules

These rules apply to all departments, events, exhibits and activities. All exhibitors must read and agree to abide by these general rules.

1. The Shippensburg Community Fair will not be responsible for any loss, damage or accident that may occur to any person, animal, article or vehicle, but will take every reasonable precaution to safeguard same.
2. All entries must be made in the name of the bona fide owner. Entries made otherwise will not be allowed to compete.
3. The Fair reserves the right to refuse any item considered unsuitable to exhibit.
4. The decision of the judges is final.
5. Any exhibitor who publicly expresses disapproval of the judge's decision, or who is guilty of conduct unbecoming of an exhibitor will be excluded from all exhibitions. His/her premiums will be forfeited, and he/she will be excused from the fairgrounds.
6. No premiums will be paid on exhibits in classes not listed in the Exhibitor's Premium Book.
7. In case of only one entry competing for the premium, judges will determine prize and ribbon to be awarded.
8. Premiums will not be paid on any item removed from the Fair before the designated release date/time.
9. Any exhibit that is not picked up by Fair release date/time listed in the Exhibitor's Premium Book will become the property of the Fair.
10. The right is reserved to inspect at any time exhibits, shows, concessions booths, stalls, or animals on the fairgrounds.
11. No loitering on Shippensburg Community Fair property.
12. No solicitation allowed on Shippensburg Community Fair property.
13. Wearing of masks, hoods or any items that obstruct the viewing of the face is prohibited.
14. Games of chance must follow state guidelines in accordance with the rules for playing games of chance. All violations will be turned over to the Pennsylvania Gaming Commission. If an individual or organization is caught breaking the state laws or guidelines in reference to games of chance, the organization's stand or booth will be shut down for the day of the Fair. If caught a second time, the stand or booth will be shut down for the remainder of the Fair.
15. No fighting is allowed on the Shippensburg Fairgrounds at any time. Those involved will be escorted off the fairgrounds and will not be permitted back on the property for the rest of the evening. Those caught a second time will not be permitted on the property for the remainder of the Fair. Repeat offenders will be arrested for trespassing.
16. No bicycles or skateboards are permitted on Fair property. Any bicycles brought onto the fairgrounds must be parked inside Gate \#1 along the fence. The Shippensburg Community Fair is not responsible for any bicycle brought to the Fair.
17. No alcohol of any kind is permitted on the property. Anyone found with alcohol will be removed from the fairgrounds immediately and all premiums forfeited.
18. No trespassing is permitted on the Shippensburg Fairgrounds property.
19. No parking is permitted around any buildings or unauthorized parking areas on the Fairgrounds. Violators may be towed at the owner's expense.
20. All vendors and food concession stands must follow guidelines established in reference to the delivery of
food, supplies, and other items for the operation of their stand.
21. No running or horseplay is permitted.
22. No firearms, knives, clubs, or other weapons are allowed on Shippensburg Fairgrounds property with the exception of authorized law enforcement personnel.
23. All vendors must break down and take all cardboard to the designated dumpster or recycling area at the end of the food stands for proper disposal.
24. No vehicles with the intention of tearing down vendor booths or stands will be permitted on the Fairgrounds on Saturday night until 11:00 PM (subject to change).
25. Any violation of the above rules will result in an expulsion from the fairgrounds. The length of said expulsion may vary based on the severity of the violation. If an individual or organization violates Pennsylvania State Law, the proper law enforcement agency will be contacted. Any decision for expulsion will be made by the Security \& Safety Committee. Anyone expelled may appeal this decision to a threemember panel consisting of the Fair Board President (or his/her designee), a member of the Security \& Safety Committee, and a Fair Board member at large. Any decision of this panel is final.

## Rules \& Regulations of Premiums and Exhibits

By entering an item or animal for exhibit, the person exhibiting said item agrees to abide by the following general rules and procedures. Failure to do so may result in forfeiture of premiums and possible removal from the fairgrounds. In addition, the exhibitor and his/her exhibit(s) must comply with all health and department/section-specific rules listed under the appropriate headings in this Premium Book.

## General Rules \& Regulations of Exhibits

1. Exhibit space must be paid in full by the dates listed in each department.
2. All expense of transportation and transfer to the space allotted must be paid by the owner.
3. All articles on exhibit must be respected as private property and any person detected in purloining or injuring them will be dealt with according to law.
4. This Shippensburg Community Fair assumes no responsibility in cases of loss or damage to stock or other exhibits, from any cause. In case anyone is injured, the privilege renter or exhibitor shall assume all responsibility, therefore, and shall indemnify the Fair for any and all expenses occasioned by such an accident or injury.
5. Exhibitors are required to give personal attention to their property and animals and at the close of the Fair to see to their removal; only on this condition are entries received and the Fair will not assume any liability for personal injury sustained by any person entering the grounds. All persons renting privileges upon the ground and all exhibitors of livestock, machinery, etc., must so attend to their removal as the Fair will not assume further responsibility.
6. A penalty will be imposed on exhibitors who knowingly exhibit diseased stock.
7. No disorderly conduct of any kind will be permitted. A police force will be upon the grounds to prevent inappropriate behavior and see that all rules and regulations are strictly observed.
8. The management appreciates all courtesies from members of the press, local and from other town and cities, and will be glad to meet with any who may find it convenient to attend the Fair. Admission will be cheerfully furnished to publishers, editors and chosen representatives presenting proper credentials to the office.
9. The Fair will not be responsible for typographical errors.
10. No alcoholic beverages, drugs, or other controlled substances are permitted on the fairgrounds. Exhibitors using alcohol will be removed from the fairgrounds immediately with all premiums forfeited.
11. Anyone not exhibiting livestock at the Fair will not be permitted on the fairgrounds between midnight and 6:00 AM unless they have special permission from the Fair Office.
12. Livestock and Dairy trailers and trucks being parked on the fairgrounds during the week should be parked at the west end of the lot beyond the tractor pull area (Gate 10).

# YOUTH, FARM, and HOME EXHIBITS

## General Rules:

1. Fruits, grains, vegetables, flowers, etc., must have been grown by the exhibitor and all hand-crafted goods must have been made by the exhibitor.
2. All exhibits (except Baked Goods) must reach fairgrounds between 9:00 AM and 4:00 PM on Monday, July $22^{\text {nd }}$, and are not to be removed before 9:00 AM on Monday, July $29^{\text {th }}$.
3. No article can compete in more than one entry, that is, an article can be judged but once. Articles having no competition will not receive a premium unless worthy.
4. No exhibitor can compete against themselves, that is, an exhibitor is NOT permitted to enter more than 1 entry in a single entry class.
5. Maximum care will be taken of the exhibits but the fair is not responsible for any damage or losses.
6. Youth exhibits entered are based upon grade level just completed. Any youth who has just completed the $12^{\text {th }}$ grade may exhibit in the Youth Division.
7. All canned food products should have been put up since August $1^{\text {st }}$ of the previous year.
8. All entries must have been made by the exhibitor since the close of last year's fair.
9. All Baked Goods should be brought to the Home Products Building \#1 on Tuesday, July $23^{\text {rd }}$ between 9:00 AM and 12:00 Noon. Judging will take place at 1:00 PM. After judging, only a portion of the product will be displayed during fair week.
10. Remainder of each exhibit of Baked Goods will be sold at an auction on Tuesday evening at 5:30 PM. Proceeds will go to the Shippensburg Community Fair. Those who desire not to donate their Baked Goods for the auction should state this at time of entry.
11. All exhibits will be judged on Tuesday, July $23^{\text {rd }}$. The right is reserved to award premium of grade which the exhibited article merits. Judges may
disqualify an entry not meeting the intent of the regulations and the spirit of the competition.
12. Chairmen of departments reserve the right of refusing to accept any entry. Furthermore, department chairmen reserve the right to bar from competition any articles of decidedly inferior quality and those not possessing sufficient merit to warrant recognition. During the week, the chairmen may also remove any exhibit that has wilted or become unfit for exhibition and may dispose of this exhibit at their discretion.
13. Buildings will be open to the public as follows:

14. Premium money should be picked up at Home Products Building \#1 on Monday following fair week between 9:00 AM and 1:00 PM. Items and premiums will also be available on that Monday evening following fair week between 6:00 PM and 8:00 PM in Home Products Building \#1.
15. NO exhibits may be removed before 9:00 AM Monday, July $29^{\text {th }}$. However, all exhibits are to be removed that day. The Fair will not be responsible for any exhibits or ribbons remaining. Any exhibits remaining Monday will be disposed of at the discretion of the Fair.
16. All exhibited items should be pre-registered either by the online registration process or mailing in the registration form. Deadline for this year is July $13^{\text {th }}$.
17. NO PREMIUM CHECKS WILL BE MAILED.

2. Exhibit must represent an organization and not an individual.
3. Exhibits are to be 4 foot in width and made to set on a table, a back is provided but exhibitor must provide covering for it if desired.
4. Reservation for display space must be made by completing the pre-registration form and received by the July $13^{\text {th }}$. due date. Exhibits not pre-registered by this date may be exhibited only if there is available space.
5. Please specify at time of reservation if your display will need electricity.

## Department 11 - Youth Under 19

## Section 1 - Youth Vegetables

Tips on exhibiting vegetables:

1. In selecting vegetables for exhibition, choose specimens that would bring the highest market price. Do not select the largest, select medium size specimens.
2. Following factors are generally used by the vegetable judge.
a. True to variety type. If possible pick specimens from one variety.
b. Uniformity in shape, size and color.
c. Be sure to pick out a perfect specimen, then select the others as similar to it as possible. Never mix specimens of different maturity.
d. Protect from dirt, disease, infection, and mechanical damage. Select specimens that are perfect and show no blemishes of any kind.
e. Condition and maturity. Be sure that exhibits are of high quality.
f. Potatoes should not be washed. Remove soil using a soft cloth or brush.
g. Tomatoes should have stems removed. Carrots, beets, etc. should have tops (leaves) removed from vegetables leaving about two inches of stems.

The goal of the PA Preferred" Baking Contest is to encourage young people across the Commonwealth to participate in Pennsylvania's agricultural fairs by showcasing Pennsylvania grown and produced products in their contest entries.

## RULES:

1. Open to any individual amateur baker (ages 8 through 18 at the time of the fair's contest) who is a Pennsylvania resident. One entry per person.
2. Entrants may NOT have won 1st place in this PA Preferred ${ }^{\text { }}$ Junior Baking contest at any other fair in 2024.
3. Entry must be six (6) individual sized portions of the baked entry item (cookies, brownies or bars).
4. The Cookies, Brownies or Bars, and any fillings and frostings, must be made from scratch with edible ingredients. No pre-packaged ingredients may be used (ex: no pre-made mixes, cookie dough, pie crust, frosting, etc.). Any decorations must just be edible.
5. At least two (2) PA Preferred ${ }^{*}$ or locally produced ingredients must be used in the recipe. Some examples of qualifying ingredients include grains (such as outs or flour), butter, milk, eggs, fruits and/or vegetables.
6. A PA Preferred ${ }^{\$}$ logo is not required because not all PA Preferred ${ }^{\oplus}$ products carry the label. The name of the ingredient and the source is sufficient (see attached example). Contact RA-AGPAPreferred(o)pa.gov for any assistance with qualifying ingredients.
7. Entry must be submitted for judging on a food safe disposable setting. (All pans, plates and dishes are considered to be disposable and will not be returned.)
8. Recipe(s) must be submitted with the entry, printed on one side of $8-1 / 2^{\prime \prime} \times 11^{\prime \prime}$ sheets of paper. Recipe must list all ingredients, quantities, and the preparation instructions. The name of each PA Preferred ${ }^{*}$ ingredient or locally produced ingredient must be clearly listed along with the name of the source that made/grew the product (ex: PA Proforred Milk - Galliker's brand or Apples - Smith Farm Orchard). Entrant's name, age, address and phone number must be printed on the back side of all the pages. (All rocipes and cookies-brownies-bars will bocome the property of the Fair or PA Farm Show and will not be roturned.)
9. Refrigeration is not available at the fair or PA Farm Show. Entries that require refrigeration after baking must indicate so in the recipe. Those entries will not be sold, auctioned or otherwise distributed for consumption after judging for food safety reasons.

## Section 7 - Youth Jams, Jellies, Marmalades and Preserves

1. Jam is a form of preserve in which the fruit is diced or mashed and cooked with sugar to a good spreading consistency.

# Department 13 - Vegetables 

## Section 1 - Vegetables

Tips on exhibiting vegetables:

1. In selecting vegetables for exhibition, choose specimens that would bring the highest market price. Do not select the largest, select medium size specimens.
2. Following factors are generally used by the vegetable judge.
a. True to variety type. If possible pick specimens from one variety.
b. Uniformity in shape, size and color.
c. Be sure to pick out a perfect specimen, then select the others as similar to it as possible. Never mix specimens of different maturity.
d. Protect from dirt, disease, infection, and mechanical damage. Select specimens that are perfect and show no blemishes of any kind.
e. Condition and maturity. Be sure that exhibits are of high quality.
f. Potatoes should not be washed. Remove soil using a soft cloth or brush.
g. Tomatoes should have stems removed. Carrots, beets, etc. should have tops (leaves) removed from vegetables leaving about two inches of stems.
3. Read premium material, carefully following all rules and their regulations. If entry calls for 5 specimens, be sure to exhibit that number. Your entry will be disqualified if the correct number of specimens are not entered.

RULES for local Fair and the PA Farm Show contests are as follows:

1. Open to any individual amateur baker who is a Pennsylvania resident. One entry per person.
2. Entrants may NOT have won 1st place in this Blue Ribbon Apple Pie contest at any other fair in 2024.
3. The Apple Pie, including fillings and crust, must be made from scratch with edible ingredients. No prepackaged ingredients may be used (ex: no pre-made mixes, cookie dough, pie crust, frosting, etc.) Any decorations must just be edible.
4. Recipe must include at least $\mathbf{6 0 \%}$ apples in the filling. It does not need to be a "traditional" two crusted apple pie and it can have a variety of fillings.
5. The entire pie must be submitted for judging in a food safe disposable pie pan. (All pans, plates and dishes are considered to be disposable and will not be returned.)
6. The recipe for the pie and pie crust must be submitted with the entry. It should be submitted on one side of $81 / 2$ " by 11 " sheets of paper. The recipe must list all the ingredients, quantities, and the preparation instructions. Entrant's name, address and phone number must be printed on the back side of all the pages. (All recipes and pies will become the property of the Fair or PA Farm Show and will not be returned.)
7. Refrigeration is not available at the Fair or PA Farm Show. Entries that require refrigeration after baking must indicate so in the recipe. Those entries will not be sold, auctioned or otherwise distributed for consumption after judging for food safety reasons.
