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Fair Operating Guidelines

The Fair's primary goal is to ensure the safety and equitable treatment and access to all visitors, exhibitors, volunteers, and fairgoers. To accomplish this goal, we enforce the following rules and guidelines during our events.

Fair Rules & Policies

All final decisions regarding all Shippensburg Community Fair exhibits, events or activities will be made by the Shippensburg Community Fair Executive Committee.

No alcohol, illegal drugs or fireworks will be allowed on the fairgrounds.

No pets, except service animals and properly identified service animals-in-training will be allowed anywhere on the fairgrounds. Arrangements for service animals must be made in advance and approved by safety personnel.

The right is reserved to inspect at any time exhibits, shows, concession booths, stalls, or animals at the fairgrounds.

Exhibitors and volunteers over 18 years of age grant permission to the Shippensburg Community Fair to use their name, likeness, voice and words in television, radio, films, newspapers, magazines, and other media and in any form, not heretofore describe for the lawful purpose and activities of the Shippensburg Community Fair. Exhibitors and volunteers understand that they will not receive any compensation for the use of their name or likeness.

General Guidelines & Rules

These rules apply to all departments, events, exhibits and activities. All exhibitors must read and agree to abide by these general rules.

- The Shippensburg Community Fair will not be responsible for any loss, damage or accident that may occur to any person, animal, article or vehicle, but will take every reasonable precaution to safeguard same.
- All entries must be made in the name of the bona fide owner. Entries made otherwise will not be allowed to compete.
- 3. The Fair reserves the right to refuse any item considered unsuitable to exhibit.
- 4. The decision of the judges is final.
- 5. Any exhibitor who publicly expresses disapproval of the judge's decision, or who is guilty of conduct unbecoming of an exhibitor will be excluded from all exhibitions. His/her premiums will be forfeited, and he/she will be excused from the fairgrounds.
- 6. No premiums will be paid on exhibits in classes not listed in the Exhibitor's Premium Book.
- 7. In case of only one entry competing for the premium, judges will determine prize and ribbon to be awarded.
- 8. Premiums will not be paid on any item removed from the Fair before the designated release date/time.
- Any exhibit that is not picked up by Fair release date/time listed in the Exhibitor's Premium Book will become the property of the Fair.
- The right is reserved to inspect at any time exhibits, shows, concessions booths, stalls, or animals on the fairgrounds.
- 11. No loitering on Shippensburg Community Fair property.
- 12. No solicitation allowed on Shippensburg Community Fair property.
- 13. Wearing of masks, hoods or any items that obstruct the viewing of the face is prohibited.

- 14. Games of chance must follow state guidelines in accordance with the rules for playing games of chance. All violations will be turned over to the Pennsylvania Gaming Commission. If an individual or organization is caught breaking the state laws or guidelines in reference to games of chance, the organization's stand or booth will be shut down for the day of the Fair. If caught a second time, the stand or booth will be shut down for the remainder of the Fair.
- 15. No fighting is allowed on the Shippensburg Fairgrounds at any time. Those involved will be escorted off the fairgrounds and will not be permitted back on the property for the rest of the evening. Those caught a second time will not be permitted on the property for the remainder of the Fair. Repeat offenders will be arrested for trespassing.
- 16. No bicycles or skateboards are permitted on Fair property. Any bicycles brought onto the fairgrounds must be parked inside Gate #1 along the fence. The Shippensburg Community Fair is not responsible for any bicycle brought to the Fair.
- 17. No alcohol of any kind is permitted on the property. Anyone found with alcohol will be removed from the fairgrounds immediately and all premiums forfeited.
- 18. No trespassing is permitted on the Shippensburg Fairgrounds property.
- 19. No parking is permitted around any buildings or unauthorized parking areas on the Fairgrounds. Violators may be towed at the owner's expense.
- All vendors and food concession stands must follow guidelines established in reference to the delivery of

- food, supplies, and other items for the operation of their stand.
- 21. No running or horseplay is permitted.
- 22. No firearms, knives, clubs, or other weapons are allowed on Shippensburg Fairgrounds property with the exception of authorized law enforcement personnel.
- 23. All vendors must break down and take all cardboard to the designated dumpster or recycling area at the end of the food stands for proper disposal.
- 24. No vehicles with the intention of tearing down vendor booths or stands will be permitted on the Fairgrounds on Saturday night until 11:00 PM (subject to change).
- 25. Any violation of the above rules will result in an expulsion from the fairgrounds. The length of said expulsion may vary based on the severity of the violation. If an individual or organization violates Pennsylvania State Law, the proper law enforcement agency will be contacted. Any decision for expulsion will be made by the Security & Safety Committee. Anyone expelled may appeal this decision to a three-member panel consisting of the Fair Board President (or his/her designee), a member of the Security & Safety Committee, and a Fair Board member at large. Any decision of this panel is final.

Rules & Regulations of Premiums and Exhibits

By entering an item or animal for exhibit, the person exhibiting said item agrees to abide by the following general rules and procedures. Failure to do so may result in forfeiture of premiums and possible removal from the fairgrounds. In addition, the exhibitor and his/her exhibit(s) must comply with all health and department/section-specific rules listed under the appropriate headings in this Premium Book.

General Rules & Regulations of Exhibits

- 1. Exhibit space must be paid in full by the dates listed in each department.
- 2. All expense of transportation and transfer to the space allotted must be paid by the owner.
- All articles on exhibit must be respected as private property and any person detected in purloining or injuring them will be dealt with according to law.
- 4. This Shippensburg Community Fair assumes no responsibility in cases of loss or damage to stock or other exhibits, from any cause. In case anyone is injured, the privilege renter or exhibitor shall assume all responsibility, therefore, and shall indemnify the Fair for any and all expenses occasioned by such an accident or injury.
- 5. Exhibitors are required to give personal attention to their property and animals and at the close of the Fair to see to their removal; only on this condition are entries received and the Fair will not assume any liability for personal injury sustained by any person entering the grounds. All persons renting privileges upon the ground and all exhibitors of livestock, machinery, etc., must so attend to their removal as the Fair will not assume further responsibility.
- 6. A penalty will be imposed on exhibitors who knowingly exhibit diseased stock.
- 7. No disorderly conduct of any kind will be permitted. A police force will be upon the grounds to prevent inappropriate behavior and see that all rules and regulations are strictly observed.
- 8. The management appreciates all courtesies from members of the press, local and from other town and cities, and will be glad to meet with any who may find it convenient to attend the Fair. Admission will be cheerfully furnished to publishers, editors and chosen representatives presenting proper credentials to the office.
- 9. The Fair will not be responsible for typographical errors.
- 10. **No alcoholic beverages**, drugs, or other controlled substances are permitted on the fairgrounds. Exhibitors using alcohol will be removed from the fairgrounds immediately with all premiums forfeited.
- 11. Anyone not exhibiting livestock at the Fair will not be permitted on the fairgrounds between midnight and 6:00 AM unless they have special permission from the Fair Office.
- 12. Livestock and Dairy trailers and trucks being parked on the fairgrounds during the week should be parked at the west end of the lot beyond the tractor pull area (Gate 10).

LIVESTOCK RULES AND REGULATIONS

Information in addition to RULES & REGULATIONS OF PREMIUMS AND EXHIBITS:

- 1. Entry blanks are available on the Shippensburg Community Fair web site at shippensburgfair.com.
- Entries must be sent to the Livestock Superintendent on or before June 1, 2023. Exhibitor's date of birth MUST be listed on entry form for showmanship entries. Any livestock entries received from June 2 thru June 15 will be charged double entry fee. NO 9. entries post marked after June 15, 2023 will be accepted. The Fair and Livestock Committee have the right to accept or reject any or all entries.
- 3. Entries that are incomplete or do not have entry fees included will not be accepted until problem(s) have been resolved. This could result in additional charges or returned entries missing the June 15th deadline.
- 4. Additions to entry forms cannot be made after the June 15th deadline.
- Entries in Breeding classes are open to residents of Cumberland and Franklin counties only. Breeding Goats open only to Cumberland and Franklin counties 4-H and FFA members carrying these in approved record books.
- Entries in market classes are open to 4-H and FFA members of Cumberland and Franklin counties only. Animals must be carried in approved record books. All record books must be verified prior to the Fair.
- 7. Market animals must have an official county ear tag in place prior to arrival. All other ear tags MUST be removed prior to arrival (except official USDA/APHIS ear tags, i.e., Scrapie and RFID). Franklin County market animals must have a numbered white ear tag, minimum size 1 ½ inch. Ear tags must be cleaned and fully visible before arrival at the fairgrounds.
- 8. All breeding animals must be registered and identified by official ear tag, microchip or tattoo (see 4-H & FFA exception below). Junior breeding animals must be registered in the junior exhibitor's name (no animal registered in farm or parent's names, or joint ownership will be accepted in the junior breeding classes) and identified by official ear tag or tattoo.

- Copies of registration papers must accompany show entry forms for breeding goats and breeding sheep (except crossbreeds). If not sent, entries will be returned to the exhibitor. Pending registrations must be submitted by July 15, 2023 to the Livestock Superintendent.
- All goats and sheep for exhibition must be identified with an official USDA Scrapie identification. Scrapie tag must be in place prior to arrival on the fairgrounds (except registered/recorded goats and registered sheep that are tattooed and accompanied by the official registration certificate).
- 10. Only 4-H and FFA members are eligible to show crossbreed animals in the breeding show provided that these animals are carried in approved record books (these crossbreed animals are not required to have registration papers
- 11. There will be an entry fee for <u>every</u> class that is entered except for showmanship. All animals in group classes must be entered in and shown in individual classes.
- 12. Exhibitors are limited to 1 entry for each group class.
- 13. In the event of no competition in any class, the judge will decide by merit the placement of the animal.
- 14. An exhibitor may enter a maximum of 2 entries in any one class.
- 15. Breeding animals must be on the fairgrounds by 11:00 AM on Sunday, July 25, 2023 and will not be released until 9:00 PM on Tuesday, July 26, 2023.
- 16. All animals arriving on Sunday, July 25 will be checked before unloading (starting at 8:00 AM). Anyone unloading before the animals are checked by a committee member will be sent home and cannot compete in the 2023 Fair.
- 17. Mandatory exhibitors meeting will be held in the Show Arena at approximately 12:00 PM on Sunday, July 25, 2023 for breeding and 12:00 PM on Wednesday July 28, 2023 for the market exhibitors.

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- 18. Each junior market animal exhibitor may show up to two (2) goats, (2) lambs, (2) swine, (1) beef and (1) rabbit meat pen. No extra animals above these limits 28. Be sure to use only grooming products that are will be allowed to be entered, shown or sold.
- 19. Feeder Calves, Market Steers, Market Goats, Market Lambs, Market Swine cannot arrive before 8:00 AM on Wednesday, July 27, 2023. Anyone unloading before that time or before the animals are checked will be sent home and cannot compete in the 2023 Fair. Market animals must be on the Fairgrounds by 11:00 AM on Wednesday, July 27, 2023.
- 20. If market animals are not on the fairgrounds by 11:00 AM, you will not be permitted to show and will be asked to leave the fairgrounds.
- 21. All Market Animals (excluding swine) will be weighed upon arrival (July 27, 2023) before penning animals. Market Swine will be weighed at approximately 12:30 PM on Wednesday, July 27, 2023. All market classes will then be determined.
- 22. All non-sale market animals (Franklin County & Cumberland County over/under weights) will be released at 9:00 PM Friday, July 29 and must be off the fairgrounds by 10:00 AM on Saturday, July 30. Exhibitors removing their animals before publicized release time will forfeit all premiums.
- 23. Animals may be shown in either breeding or market but not both.
- 24. The Livestock Committee will assign pens and stall placing. Any exhibitor not complying with designated assignments without prior approval from the livestock superintendent shall have the option of moving to the assigned pens/stalls or leave the grounds and forfeit any entry fees paid for exhibition.
- 25. Pen size for alpacas, sheep, swine, and goats is 6' x 6'. All assigned pens and stalls shall be kept in a neat and presentable condition at all times. Failure to comply may result in forfeiture of your premiums
- 26. All pens must be cleaned before leaving the fairgrounds. This includes the grassy area outside of the hog pens and "holding" pens where animals are moved to during the pen cleaning process. All manure must be placed in a designated area and all pens must be reset and tied as you found them. A release form signed by the Livestock Committee must be presented before receiving an exhibitor check upon departure. No panels will be moved/removed at any time during the week. Exhibitors who do not comply will forfeit their premiums
- 27. No hay or bedding will be provided by the Fair. The only bedding permitted to be used on the grounds and deposited on the manure pile will be straw. Wood shavings may be used but must be cleaned out

- and hauled away. No carpet, peanut hulls or saw dust of any kind may be used!
- approved for use on meat and dairy animals when fitting your animals for show. Unapproved products may contain ingredients that result in unacceptable residues in the meat or milk. If you are not certain that a product is residue safe and approved for use on meat or dairy animals do not use it. *** Important*** If upon slaughter, treatment with drugs, biologics or any chemical from fitting products, is the cause of condemnation of a carcass, the loss of the carcass and any other damages will be borne by exhibitor.
- 29. Abuse of animals in any form will not be allowed. The use of showing and/or handling practices that may be considered objectionable or abusive, including but not limited to striking, slapping, punching, or kicking animals. Market Lambs and market goats must be exhibited with all four feet on the show ring flooring surface. Exhibitors not adhering to this rule will be given one warning and then excused from the show ring and disqualified for the present year. Entry fees will not be returned. Fair livestock committee will observe the handling of market animals, both in and out of the show ring, and will have the authority to disqualify any exhibitor for unethical practices.
- 30. All livestock exhibitors, their family members and others acting on the behalf of the exhibitor must display good sportsmanship and act in a courteous manner at the Shippensburg Fair. Unsportsmanlike conduct will be referred to the Shippensburg Fair Livestock Committee for appropriate action if the Committee deems necessary and may subsequently be referred to the Shippensburg Fair Board. Unsportsmanlike conduct may include but is not limited to physical actions, threats, or outbursts of profanity, or tampering with another exhibitor's animals. Committee action is not limited to the following but may result in the exhibitor found in violation to be barred from current or future participation in the Shippensburg Fair.
- 31. Masks will not be permitted on animals.
- 32. NO drenching, pumping, or force-feeding of liquids, including the use of baby bottles, will be tolerated except if administered by the show veterinarian. Violators will be disqualified and may not be permitted to show at future fair shows.
- 33. Each exhibitor is encouraged to display signs and ribbons.
- 34. The Homeland Security Regulations for Community and County Fairs require open access to all buildings

- on the fairgrounds. Due to these new requirements, there will be no parking of vehicles around the livestock barns during the week of the Fair.
- 35. No generators may be operated during any species show without the prior approval of the Livestock Superintendent.
- 36. A livestock show exhibitor shall be responsible for the continuous care, including access to water at all times, grooming and preparation of the livestock entered in the livestock show.
- 37. During market animal pictures and while in the show ring, all youth showing are required to wear collared shirts that are tucked in (preferably 4-H/FFA collared shirts) and pants with no holes. Any youth 4-H or FFA member working with or showing animals must wear closed toe shoes. All 4-H and FFA members are reminded to not change their clothes until the sale is over.
- 38. Castration of lambs, goats and hogs must be initiated before initial weigh-in. They must be fully castrated and healed prior to final weigh-In at the Fair. Beef must be fully castrated and healed by the initial weigh-in. Castration means that the testicles are severed completely from the body.

- 39. For the Shippensburg Community Fair, the "Youth" category will replace both 4-H and FFA. A Youth is defined as any exhibitor that is a current member of 4-H or FFA.
- 40. All market lambs and market goats may be mouthed and must have a full set of lamb or kid teeth.
- 41. All animals in a group class must be shown in an individual class.
- 42. Only exhibitors, ring personnel and judge(s) will be permitted in the ring during the show. Parents (and photographers) should remain outside the show ring while the show is in progress.
- 43. By entering in the fair, you are giving the livestock committee permission to use your animals for the stockman's and supreme showmanship contest.
- 44. All animals must be free of blankets, jackets and covers while being checked in trailers, while checking in, during weigh in and throughout the veterinarian walk through.
- 45. Canopies will be limited to 1 per family and can be no larger than 10' x 10'.

Department 3 - Beef Cattle

Information in addition to Livestock Rules and Regulations:

- 1. Cattle must be identified with a 15-digit 840 series ISO-compliant radio frequency identification (RFID) ear tag; the ear tag number must be recorded on the Pennsylvania health certificate or CVI.
- 2. Entry fees are \$6.50 per class entered.
- 3. All classes must be listed on entry form. This includes pair class, group classes and showmanship. If you do not list it, you will be ineligible to show in that class.
- 4. Entries MUST be sent to the Livestock Superintendent, Lois Zeigler, 106 Carlisle Road, Newville, PA 17241 on or before June 1st. Any livestock entries received from June 2 thru June 15 will be charged double entry fee. NO entries will be accepted after June 15, 2023.
- 5. Steers are not permitted to show in any breeding class.
- 6. Any evidence of tampering with a calf will automatically disqualify any entry this includes such things as filling with a foreign substance and the use of tranquilizers or drugs. The presence of any drug, antibiotic or biological residue in an exhibitor's calf at the roundup will result in forfeiture of all sale proceeds and premiums. Any drug or antibiotic which is administered to the animal will be done in strict compliance with the manufacturer's label requirements (including medicated feeds with withdrawal label). Testing may be done at any time upon request of the Show Committee.
- 7. Any calf that becomes unruly and dangerous will also be disqualified and not permitted to be shown or sold.
- 8. Calves must have a rope halter and neck collar with tie (furnished by the exhibitor) on them at all times.

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9. **Feeder Calves only**. No clipping or grooming on feeder calves. No blocking or balling of tails. No grooming products will be allowed at the fair. Wash and blow dry only. Calves will be checked when entering the show ring and animals having any grooming products on them will not be permitted to show.

Health Rules and Regulations:

- 1. NO BRUCELLOSIS OR TUBERCULOSIS TESTS ARE REQUIRED.
- 2. VACCINATION REQUIREMENTS: All entries shall be accompanied by "Certificate of Veterinary Inspection" (CVI) signed by an accredited veterinarian. The certificate must be issued within 30 days of the start of the Fair, list all animals and includes a statement that the animal(s) identified have been immunized against IBR, PI3 and BVD, using at least 2 doses of killed vaccine, 2-4 weeks apart or 1 dose of Modified Live Vaccine (MLV). The most recent vaccine must be administered not less than 30 days or more than 180 days before the opening day of the Fair.
- 3. A current rabies vaccination administered by a licensed veterinarian is required for animals 3 months of age and older (market cattle are exempt from this vaccination requirement). All vaccine label directions must be followed, and all rabies vaccinated cattle must be accompanied by a rabies vaccination certificate or the vaccination information must be included on the CVI. If a rabies vaccination certificate is provided, the certificate must contain the legible name and contact information of the veterinarian who administered the vaccine and the veterinarian's signature. A copy of the rabies vaccination certificate is acceptable.

Dairy Feeder

- 1. Dairy feeder calves MUST be 100% Holstein breed bloodlines (red and white or black and white acceptable).
- 2. Dairy feeder calves must be male, no heifers allowed. All animals must be castrated and dehorned males. Cryptorchids and improperly castrated calves will be placed last in class and will not be permitted to go through the sale. Castration by means of surgical cut or banding only by the official weigh-in date in May. No clamping of the scrotum by use of a burdizzo will be permitted. If castration wound is not healed by weigh in at fair, the calf will be disqualified. The castration site will be checked at weigh-in.
- 3. No animals showing clinical signs of contagious or infectious disease, including active ring worm, warts, lice and mange, will be admitted to the fair.
- 4. Exhibitor may have two dairy feeder calves on feed but is limited to exhibiting and selling one at fair.

- 1. Entry fees are \$5.00 per class entered.
- 2. All classes must be listed on entry form. This includes pair class, group classes and showmanship. If you do not list it, you will be ineligible to show in that class.
- 3. Entries MUST be sent to the Livestock Superintendent, Lois Zeigler, 106 Carlisle Road, Newville, PA 17241 on or before June 1. Any livestock entries received from June 2 thru June 15 will be charged double entry fee. NO entries will be accepted after June 15. 2023.
- 4. Date for competing ages on all sheep shall be September 1, 2022 for Senior Lambs and January 1, 2023 for Junior Lambs.
- 5. Market Lambs will be shown by weight.
- 6. Market Lambs must be exhibited with all four feet on the show ring surface. Exhibitors not adhering to this rule will be given one warning and then excused from the show ring and disqualified for this species for the present year.

Health Rules and Regulations:

- 1. All sheep must bear an official USDA/APHIS ear tag to be exhibited at the show. Sheep from flocks on the voluntary scrapie program must bear the official ear tag, tattoo, or electronic ear implant.
- 2. No sheep showing clinical signs of contagious or infectious disease, including active ringworm, caseous lymphadenitis, sore mouth, foot rot, warts, lice or mange will be admitted.
- 3. All sheep must be clearly identified on a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) of the state of origin. The certificate must be issued within 30 days of the start of the Fair and list all animals. A copy of the CVI must accompany the sheep to the show and be available for inspection at all times during the show as additional inspections of sheep health certificates will be made.
 - a. Identification Purebred animals must be identified by registry name and number, corresponding to the ear tag or tattoo number. Crossbreed animals must be identified by farm-flock number, corresponding to the ear tag or tattoo number.

- b. Flock Inspection Flocks must be examined after June 20, 2023. The veterinarian who has examined the entries and the flocks from which they come must certify on the health certificate that she/he has found no evidence of transmissible disease and to the best of her/his knowledge, no exposure thereto, and are not subject to any quarantine restrictions.
- 4. A current rabies vaccination administered by a licensed veterinarian is required for animals 3 months of age and older (market sheep are exempt from this vaccination requirement). All vaccine label directions must be followed, and all rabies vaccinated sheep must be accompanied by a rabies vaccination certificate or the vaccination information must be included on the CVI. If a rabies vaccination certificate is provided, the certificate must contain the legible name and contact information of the veterinarian who administered the vaccine and the veterinarian's signature. A copy of the rabies vaccination certificate is acceptable.

Information in addition to Livestock Rules and Regulations:

- 1. Entry fees are \$5.00 per class entered.
- 2. All classes must be listed on entry form. This includes pair class, group classes and showmanship. If you do not list it, you will be ineligible to show in that class.
- 3. Entries MUST be sent to the Livestock Superintendent, Lois Zeigler, 106 Carlisle Road, Newville, PA 17241 on or before June 1st. Any livestock entries received from June 2 thru June 15 will be charged double entry fee. NO entries will be accepted after June 15, 2023.

- 4. Hair on hogs cannot be less than 1" in length. This includes ears, tails and bellies. Hogs will be checked at show time and will not be allowed to show if hair is less than 1". All decisions will be at the discretion of the Swine Department.
- 5. Hogs must have bedding (straw or shavings) in their pens. Shavings must be taken home by the exhibitor.
- 6. Swine must have an official 840 series radio frequency identification (RFID) ear tag and the ear tag number must be recorded on the Pennsylvania health certificate or ICVI.
 - a. It is the exhibitor's responsibility to obtain and apply these tags if they are not applied at the time of purchase.
 - b. Exhibitor may apply for premises ID through PDA and purchase RFID tags through a distributor.
- 7. Any swine showing signs of illness upon arrival shall not be permitted to unload.
- 8. All market swine exhibited in PDA sponsored market shows shall move directly to a PDA or USDA-licensed slaughter facility following the animal exhibition and may not be diverted to premises other than a recognized slaughter establishment or a slaughter market in which the sales are designated slaughter only sales.
 - a. No Franklin County swine will be permitted at the fair.
 - b. Over and underweight swine will be sold to buyback buyers.

1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI), signed by an accredited veterinarian must accompany all swine. It must state that the animal(s) show no signs of contagious or infectious diseases. The certificate must be issued within **14 days** of the start of the Fair and list all animals.

- 5. TUBERCULOSIS TESTS AND BRUCELLOSIS TESTS ARE NOT REQUIRED.

- 1. Entries MUST be sent to the Livestock Superintendent, Lois Zeigler, 106 Carlisle Road, Newville, PA 17241 on or before June 1st. Any livestock entries received from June 2 thru June 15 will be charged double entry fee. NO entries will be accepted after June 15, 2023.
- 2. Entry fee is \$2.50 per head for breeding rabbits and \$4.00 for meat pens. Entry fees must accompany entries. Limits are 8 head per exhibitor plus 1 meat pen.
- 3. This is an open rabbit show. However, cage space may be limited. In the event there are more entries than cage space, preference will be given to 4-H and FFA members of Cumberland and Franklin Counties. Also, exhibitor restrictions on number of entries exhibited may be implemented. Double premiums will not be paid to youth entries. Please note if showing a 4-H or FFA project, you must have an approved project book.
- 4. Rabbits will be checked before unloading at the fairgrounds starting at 8:00 AM on Sunday, July 23, 2023. Anyone unloading before the animals are checked by a committee member will be sent home and cannot compete in the 2023 Shippensburg Community Fair.
- 5. Exhibitors must have all rabbits on the fairgrounds by 11:00 AM on Sunday July 23, 2023. No rabbit may leave the Fair prior to 9:00 PM on Tuesday, July 25, 2023.
- 6. No rabbit showing clinical signs of contagious or infectious disease or of an unhealthy nature will be eligible for display and competition. The Chair reserves the right to bar entries that do not appear to be of a healthy nature.
- 7. While this is not an American Rabbit Breeders Association (ARBA) show, and their rules do not apply, the judge will use the breed guidelines outlined in the <u>ARBA Standard of Perfection</u> in his/her placings. Animals with ARBA disqualifications will not be disqualified, but may receive a lower merit.
- 8. Rabbits will be shown by breed. However, breeds will not be broken down by variety.
- 9. No rabbit may compete in more than one class. Exhibitors are limited to two entries per class.
- 10. Exhibitors must supply fresh feed and water for their entry daily. Cages need to be cleaned as well. Final cage cleaning approved by the chair must be completed before a check will be issued. Exhibitors may have a solid floor cage and will be expected to provide saw dust or wood chips as bedding. Exhibitors should come prepared to bed their animals on a solid floor cage. Exhibitors are required to bring their own water bottles and feeders.
- 11. Exhibitors must supply a lock (or suitable devise to secure cage door) for their cage during the Fair. In addition, a key for the lock must be presented to the Chair to be kept in the Livestock Office for emergencies.
- 12. Class winners and overall breed winners will receive ribbons and/or rosettes provided by the Shippensburg Community Fair. Additional awards and their sponsors for showmanship and the breed classes will be announced at the show.
- 13. It is encouraged that all rabbit entries are tattooed in their left ear. However, rabbits not tattooed will have a designation placed in their ear by the chair with a sharpie marker prior to judging.
- 14. Rabbits do not require a veterinarian health certificate, but a "Veterinarian-Client-Patient Relationship Form" must be submitted with each animal listed separately when you check your entry in with the chair.

Section 18 - Meat Pen

DEPARTMENT 9

- 1. Competition in this division is limited to 4-H and FFA members currently enrolled in Cumberland & Franklin Counties. Rabbit Meat Pens exhibited must be part of a project carried in an approved record book.
- 2. Each exhibitor is limited to one rabbit meat pen. A meat pen consists of 3 rabbits of the same breed and variety as recognized and accepted in the current edition of the ARBA Standards of Perfection.
- 3. The exhibitor must own the buck and does before May 1st of the current project year. Exhibitors must breed their own does to their own bucks & kindle their own kits. Each exhibitor should have at least 2-3 does and a buck.
- 4. All Rabbits must be the property of the person entering them. Meat Pens must be raised by the exhibitor and cannot be purchased or leased.
- 5. Meat pens will not be shown in breed class- shown only as a meat pen of three.
- 6. Exhibitors may not "Share" their ten meat pen rabbits with another exhibitor
- The date for calculation of the 70 days' age rule will be the day rabbits arrive at Shippensburg Community Fair.
- 8. The top 4 meat pens will remain on the Fairgrounds until the sale.
- 9. Owner must notify the Rabbit Chair (email address is at beginning of section) of their intent to enter a meat pen before the doe is bred.
- 10. Members must fill out a Breeder Validation Form and mail the completed form to the rabbit chair within 7 days after the rabbits are born. Breeder Validation Forms are available in the 2023 Shippensburg Community Fair Livestock catalog.
- 11. Members must either tag or tattoo their animals. There will be a check-in event at the Cumberland County Extension Office prior to June 25th. Members will bring their rabbits to the check-in to verify they have been tagged or tattooed.
- 12. Animals will be weighed during check-in at Shippensburg Community Fair.
- 13. The rabbit judge will hold the right to disqualify any animals that do not warrant participation in the show.
- 14. As with the other species, over/under weight meat pen rabbits can be shown for purposes of completing your project.
- 15. The top 4 Meat Pens will be sold in the sale.
- 16. Rabbits shown in Meat Pen class cannot be shown in the breed classes, although the sire and/or dam can be entered in the breed classes.

The participants will be judged on their knowledge within the following categories:

1. Rabbit Showmanship

Exhibitors will meet with the judge and be scored individually. The score will be based on the following: carrying the rabbit to the table; posing; checking ears, teeth, eyes and nose; checking toenails, hocks, front feet, abdomen, legs, and tail; checking sex; checking fur; the exhibitor's appearance, actions and knowledge. Exhibitor's knowledge will be tested by answering questions related to the breed exhibited, diseases, and standard management practices. The exhibitor is not restricted to a specific order for the presentation.

1. **ELIGIBILITY:** Competition in this division is limited to 4-H and FFA members currently enrolled in Cumberland & Franklin Counties. Animals exhibited must be part of a project carried in an approved record book. Each breeding animal must be registered in the name of the junior exhibitor (no animal registered in farm or parent's names will be accepted in the junior breeding classes). Registration papers are not required for crossbreed animals). No farm name, parent's name or joint ownership is permitted!

- 2. Use standard entry form and mark appropriate boxes, complete necessary information and mail to the Livestock Superintendent.
- 3. All Junior Livestock exhibitors are required to complete Quality Assurance/ Good Production Practices training annually. Failure to participate in certified training by July 1 annually will result in the member's inability to show animals or sell project animal(s) at Shippensburg Community Fair.
- 4. All Junior Livestock exhibitors are required to show their own animals unless a written excuse is presented and approved by the livestock superintendent prior to the show. Failure to comply will result in forfeiture of your premiums.
- 5. All animals shown in market classes must be sold at the sale except for Franklin County animals and over and underweight goats, lambs, steers, and feeder calves. Over and underweight market swine will go directly to the buyback buyer. Private treaty sales with buyback buyers or sale buyers will not be allowed.
- 6. All market swine exhibited in a PDA sponsored market show shall move directly to a PDA or USDA licensed slaughter facility following the animal exhibition and may not be diverted to premises other than a recognized slaughter establishment or a slaughter market in which the sales are designated slaughter only sales.

SHIPPENSBURG COMMUNITY FAIR JUNIOR LIVESTOCK SALE RULES:

- 1. **ELIGIBILITY:** Only animals carried as 4-H or FFA projects in Cumberland County are eligible to be sold in this sale.
- 2. **LIMITS:** Each junior exhibitor may sell up to two (2) goats, (2) lambs, (2) swine, (1) beef, and (1) rabbit meat pen. (First thru Fourth place)

3. **WEIGHT LIMITS:** Market Lambs - 80 to 150 lbs.

Market Hogs - 215 to 295 lbs.

Market Goats - 60 to 110 lbs.

Market Steers - 1,000 to 1,875 lbs.

Dairy Feeders - 400 to 800 lbs.

Rabbit Meat Pen - 3 ½ lbs. to 5 ½ lbs.

- 4. **RECORD/PROJECT BOOKS:** Each Junior Livestock exhibitor must maintain up-to-date records on all project animals throughout the year. Animals not verified by their records will be denied the opportunity to exhibit as Junior Livestock projects and sell in the sale. Records must also be finalized after the Fair and submitted for approval at the end of the 4-H or FFA year, in each species exhibited, by the Junior Livestock exhibitor to be eligible to show or sell that same species the following year.
- 5. **DUTIES:** Cumberland County 4-H Clubs and Cumberland County FFA Chapters will rotate assignments between sale ring set-up, sale ring tear down, and animal loading after the sale each year. All Junior Livestock exhibitors are expected to help where assigned.
- 6. **THANK YOU LETTERS:** A thank you letter to each buyer of every animal sold must be presented to Shippensburg Community Fair Livestock Sale Treasurer before payment will be released.
- 7. **MARKET ANIMALS:** Animals consigned for slaughter during or immediately following the show shall not receive any treatment with drugs or biologics within the withdrawal time prior to slaughter. Withdrawal times for drugs and biologics are all stated on the directions for use. Label directions must be followed at all times.

8. Pen Checking: Exhibitors are not permitted to clean their pens during the sale.

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Section x99 - Showmanship Contests

In each of the five species, market and breeding, there will be a showmanship competition. This competition will consist of approximately 100% showmanship and 0% fitting. While fitting is not part of the showmanship judging, animals must be presented in acceptable manner. Animals must be clean, dry, and free of foreign matter. This includes hair, feet, legs, ears and nose. Note: Market Beef showmanship and Dairy Feeders showmanship will compete separately but champions of each of these divisions will compete together to determine the beef representative for the Supreme Showmanship contest.

- 1. Competition in showmanship is limited to 4-H and FFA members currently enrolled in Cumberland and Franklin counties.
- 2. Exhibitor age is determined as of Sunday, the opening day of the Fair. Date of birth MUST be listed on entry form.
- 3. Each exhibitor must use his/her own animal in this competition, except for alpacas.
- 4. Exhibitors competing for Grand Champion Showman must use the same animal that was used in previous Showmanship class.
- The Livestock Committee reserves the right to split the classes due to class size.
- If a handler is seen using aggressive behavior with their animal, after one warning, they will be removed from the show ring.
- 7. The winner in each class will receive a special award.

The breeding division awards are sponsored as follows:

- 1. Showmanship classes follow the show order: Senior, Junior, Intermediate and Novice, Grand Champion
- 2. All exhibitors are required to compete in showmanship for all species that they exhibit.

Pee Wee Showmanship Contest

- 1. Exhibitors must be 5-8 years of age the day of the show and must have an older sibling or 4-H/FFA member showing market livestock at the fair. Youth that are current 4-H members do not qualify for Pee Wee showmanship.
- 2. Pee Wee Exhibitors may only show one species.
- 3. Pee Wee exhibitors may have assistance from a current youth exhibitor if needed; however, the evaluation of the showman would be limited to the Pee Wee and not the assistant.
- 4. The animals used by the exhibitor must be carried as a 4-H or FFA project by the older sibling.
- 5. Registration will be on Wednesday from 12 PM to 4 PM, which will include signing a liability waiver form.
- 6. The show will be on Friday at 2:00 PM.

Good Housekeeping Contest

Chairperson - Cindy Finkenbinder

All Youth Market and Youth Breeding livestock exhibits, and exhibitor areas will be judged by the Shippensburg Community Fair Livestock Committee members.

- Judging will take place daily and will be unannounced. However, judging of a species will not take place while that species is being shown.
- Breeding livestock judging will take place:
 - o Sunday between the hours of 12:00 Noon − 9:00 PM
 - Monday & Tuesday between the hours of 8:00 AM 8:00 PM
- · Market livestock judging will take place:
 - o Wednesday between the hours of 3:00 PM − 9:00 PM
 - o Thursday & Friday between the hours of 8:00 AM 9:00 PM

Each species (youth only) will be judged separately. Youth must own the animal (except alpacas) for it to be eligible for judging. Leasing or family-owned animals do not count.

Criteria used for Judging:

- Cleanliness of animals
- · Dry and clean bedding and pens free of manure
- · Exhibitor card and ribbons hung up for display and reading
- · Feed, equipment, show boxes, chairs out of walkways/aisles
- · Observance of all rules and regulations of the Shippensburg Community Fair
- Cooperation with show officials, other exhibitors and exhibiting good sportsmanship

Housekeeping should be done by the exhibitor, not by the parent, leader, or adult.

The top three exhibitors will be announced daily with ribbon presented. At the conclusion of both the breeding and market half of the week, the top youth exhibitor in each species category will be announced and receive an award.

Top 3 scoring: 1st Place - 3 points 2nd Place - 2 points 3rd Place - 1 point

- 4. Exhibitor's age is determined as of Sunday, the opening day of the Fair.

4-H and FFA Supreme Livestock Showman

Chairperson - Joe Theis

- The Supreme Livestock Showman is for champion showman in beef, swine, sheep, goats, rabbits, and alpacas. Exhibitors from both the Market and Breeding divisions are eligible to participate for a total of ten (10) exhibitors.
- 2. Showmen in these classes will show a minimum of three and a maximum of five classes of livestock available at the fairgrounds at the time of the competition. The species will be chosen based on the availability of animals, and the show order will be decided via a random draw conducted by the chairman. Participants may also be required to identify items which may include feed ingredients, livestock equipment, tack items or photographs of various types and breeds of livestock. A written general livestock knowledge quiz will be given during the competition. The scores of this quiz will be used in the event of a tie.
- NOTICE: If a showman is the champion for multiple species throughout the show week, they will represent the species in which they first receive a champion showman award – the reserve overall showman will fill the other species position. For

- instance, Sally Jo wins champion showman for market goats and market lambs, respectively. She will represent the market goat division of the overall showman competition. Nick is the second place overall showman for the lambs, and he will represent the market lamb division in the overall showman competition.
- 4. The entrant with the lowest total score will receive the Supreme Livestock Showman Award.
- Supreme Livestock Showman winners may not show their own animal.
- 6. To be held on Friday, July 28th at 5:00 PM in the Livestock Show Ring.
- Time Each class will be limited to 10 minutes unless it is necessary to extend time due to limited animal numbers. A maximum of 5 minutes will be provided between rounds to switch animals.
- 8. All showmen will have the opportunity to show all species used for the event.

- The Supreme Livestock Showman Chairperson reserves the right to remove an animal(s) for safety reasons and replace it with another of the same species.
- 10. Showman Biographies A short participant biography sheet will be handed out to each contestant; it needs to be completed BEFORE Supreme Livestock Showman. This will be read out loud to the audience. You may pick up the biography sheet at the livestock office and should do so before Friday evening of the Fair.
- Scoring (points) Participants will be ranked 1-10 in each species, with the person receiving the lowest total score for all species being the overall winner.
- 12. Scoring (Cards) The judge will have 1 sheet with all the contestants' numbers on it. Exhibitors will be identified by armbands or number cards.
- 13. How the show will run: 30 Minutes before the show there will be a mandatory meeting with the contestants and their group leaders in the Livestock Show Ring. All participants MUST BE dressed & ready to show at that time. The Chair will go over the rules, rotation, and answer any questions. Animals & contestants must be at ring side NO LATER than 5 minutes before the show

- starts. We will rotate clockwise. Each class will have 10 minutes with up to 5 minutes to switch animals. The score sheets will be collect & turned into the livestock office for tabulation. During the initial rotation an MC will be reading the participant biographies. One timer will be used. Time will be called over the loud speaker. Contestants participating in Supreme Livestock Showman must stay with their group leader when moving from species to species. There will be no talking, reviewing papers, cell phones, texting, or contact with people outside the ring. Anyone not following these rules will be eliminated from the contest. It will be at the Supreme Livestock Showman Chair's discretion.
- 14. Once a 4-H or FFA member is an overall winner, they are ineligible to compete or win in subsequent years and their name will be engraved on the Master Showman plaque to be displayed at future competitions.
- 15. Exhibitors in the contest will be given a listing of sponsor(s) and their mailing addresses
- 16. Chair will provide listing of contest winners to sponsors.
